6 Ethics Gallimaufry for IP Lawyers

Lawyers who practice in the field of Intellectual Property come across many of the same ethical issues as their counterparts in other areas of practice, but IP lawyers can also encounter problems unique to IP. Thorny questions about confidentiality, duty of candor, conflict of interest and providing competent representation can be difficult when known and potentially devastating when unknown or unrecognized. This presentation will highlight a handful of ethics issues that can arise in an IP practice (including some matters that draw the attention of the USPTO Office of Enrollment and Discipline) and will review some of the Washington Rules of Professional Conduct IP lawyers ought to keep in mind.
